Unit description

This unit provides you with an introduction to the different types of assessment instruments used by organisational psychologists and develops your skills in the use of standardised techniques and other forms of psychological assessment. Workshops are designed to increase awareness of the issues involved in psychological testing and professional practice, including the critical evaluation of assessment instruments, cross-cultural issues, feedback and reporting.

Test Administration

Assessment Type 1: Clinical performance evaluation Indicative Time on Task 2: 15 hours Due: 06/04/2024, 11.55pm Weighting: 0% This is a hurdle assessment task (see <u>assessment policy</u> for more information on hurdle assessment tasks)

In pairs, students administer components of a cognitive ability and personality test and provide verbal feedback to each other.

Critical Evaluation of Psychological Test

Assessment Type 1: Presentation Indicative Time on Task 2: 40 hours Due: In scheduled classes Weighting: 40%

Each group critically evaluates a psychometric test, presents to class members and facilitates a group discussion, and prepares a handout.

Written Report on Test Results

Assessment Type 1: Report Indicative Time on Task 2: 55 hours Due: **18/05/2024**, **11.55pm** Weighting: **60%**

Students submit a written report on test results relating to a case scenario.
