- 2. Apply basic discourse analysis frameworks
- 4. Demonstrate different registers and discourse strategies in Auslan.

- 5. Produce Auslan texts appropriate to different contexts of situation

## Research report

Due: **Week 13**

Weighting: **30%**

Analyse one discourse feature of an Auslan text. Provide a basic literature review (min 5 references), use ELAN to analyse and describe your data.

On successful completion you will be able to:

- 1. Identify and analyse discourse features of Auslan and English texts
- 2. Apply basic discourse analysis frameworks
- 3. Identify features of English and Auslan in different genres, registers and text types
