This unit is designed for advanced learners to improve their reading skills by exposing them to Japanese source materials from diverse genres and styles. Some reading texts are selected individually to suit each student's area of (professional) interest (such as economics, science, literature, sociology, linguistics). Assessment is based on unit participation (in-class and/or online); regular assignments (in-class/online tests); as well as improvement throughout the semester.

Weekly Tasks

Project

Due: 5:00 PM Friday 12th June Weighting: 30%

Project questions will be given to students in Week 8. Students will engage in a major problemsolving project. Students will demonstrate the result of their learning from each week's task. Students will use any available resources to 1) locate suitable authentic and semi-authentic texts of information, 2) identify relevant sections in the text and 3) produce a genre specific text by compiling/summarising the information.

Final Examination (Open Book)
