Unit description

This unit extends the abilities of students studying Spanish at intermediate level by exposing them to a variety of genres (poetry, painting and theatre) that explore the expression of desire of Spanish speaking women against the power of dominant gender constructions. It is expected that through a feminist Foucaultian analysis of these works the student learn about an important aspect of these societies. This unit also opens up possibilities of creative self-expression in Spanish around the theme of passion and repression.

Case study database

Due: Week 3 Weighting: 5%

Find a current news article or news video (in Spanish) about the Spanish-speaking world which reflects contemporary gender issues/gender relationships and add it to the collaborative database.

On successful completion you will be able to:

 Identify the role of gender in current and past social change and cultural production in the Spanish-speaking world.

Tutorial presentation

Due: Individually assigned

Weighting: 30%

Students will need to present on one artist, cultural product or social issue covered in the course between week 4 and week 13. Topics will be selected in week 2. This oral presentation in Spanish should **incorporate analysis of creative works/case studies**, the social, historical and political context, and not just a synthesis of biographical detail/description of events. Internal students will do a **15-minute** presentation with a corresponding powerpoint. Palm cards/scripts **are** allowed. External students will record their presentation via a voiceover narration of a powerpoint presentation by 9am on Monday morning of the week in which that topic is covered. You can access youtube tutorials and online articles to learn how to do a voiceover on your powerpoint. Alternatively, external students they can choose to deliver their presentation through Skype during class time or attend the class in person on the day of their presentation.

Cultural study reflection

Due: Weeks 7-12 Weighting: 30%

By Friday 5 pm, and on at least four out of the six weeks 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 students should post in their online journal. Posts will have 100-150 words, and may take the form of critical commentary, creative responses, or both to the topics studied in that week. The best 3 out of 4 posts will be marked out of 10 to make up the 30%, however if you only complete 3 posts in total you will automatically forfeit 7.5 marks from the total following marking of your 3 entries.

Analytical report

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 25%

500 word analytical report, in which you select an article provided by ANOTHER student in the database of case studies. In your report, analyse site of publication, anticipated audience, authorial intent, historical/social context that informs the events described (you will need to investigate this using sources beyond the article itself), and relationship to the themes of this course.

Participation

Due: **Ongoing** Weighting: **10%**

The participation mark is based on reading articles/watching weekly resources and demonstrating comprehension in class through questions, comments and contributions to discussion, and/or use of online discussion forum to post weekly comments on topics. A general discussion question will be provided on the forum each week so that you can prepare some comments in advance/post in written form if you are not confident speaking in class.
