Unit description

This unit examines some of the most representative texts of Polish prose and poetry. Students will read two of the six prescribed novels by such authors as W. Gombrowicz, Cz. Miłosz (Nobel Prize), T. Konwicki and S. Lem. Poetry will be represented by W. Szymborska (Nobel Prize), M. Pawlikowska-Jasnorzewska, H. Poświatowska, T. Różewicz, Z. Herbert, Cz. Miłosz. Reading the novels and poems will not only enrich vocabulary and knowledge of Polish literature but also will be an enjoyable activity. We hope that students will enjoy discovering an imaginative world of prose and poetry. Students will have an opportunity to study major works in Polish or English. A voluntary on-campus session will give students the opportunity to meet their lecturer and fellow students, as well as practice speaking skills and pronunciation. Interstate students will also have an opportunity to discuss the course materials.
