Unit description

This unit introduces students with no prior knowledge of the language to basic spoken Chinese. Upon completion of the unit students will be equipped with basic and practical oral/aural communication skills and cultural awareness for effective communication; students will be able to converse in simple, everyday conversational Chinese at an elementary level. Students will not be required to read and write Chinese characters.

Mid-term exam

Due: Week 7 Weighting: 20%

Mid-term Test will be conducted in the Week 7. It is a comprehensive test of your skills in reading, writing Pinyin and listening. It will be 60 minutes in length. The tests will incorporate pinyin, grammar and vocabulary covered in the course. No dictionaries are permitted

Preparation and participation

Due: Throughout the semester

Weighting: 10%

Students are expected to be well prepared in order to participate in class discussion – this will ensure good use of class time as well as improving your learning skills.

- independent engagement with online communicative activities, including discussion forum, quizz, etc
- spontaneous contributions to discussion, expression of opinions
- evidence of preparation for class through contributing specific examples demonstrating understanding of textbook/readings/home study
- · constructive collaboration with and feedback to peers
- · consistent target language use
- attentive note-taking
- structured engagement with content including evidence of revision/ organisation of notes/

continuous self-directed learning

- promotion of a positive learning environment, including:
 - mobile device etiquette (targeted and appropriate use for learning purposes as instructed by staff)
 - respectful treatment of peers / instructor e.g. not listening while peers are learning/ engaging with instructor
 - appropriate class behaviour to foster student learning, avoiding: tardiness;
 leaving class without being excused; erratic attendance disrupting the formation of a classroom community.

Oral examination

Weighting: 20%

Group oral presentation will be held in week 8 and individual speaking test is in week 12

The group oral presentation will be held in week 7 tutorials.

Two or three students in one group to do role-plays. For example, A: Ni hao, nihao ma? B: Wo hen hao, nine?

The Individual Speaking Test will be conducted in the Week 12.

Students needs to do a three-minute solo speech. For example, Nihao, wo jiao...(name). Woshi Aodaliya ren...

Final examination

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 30%

The exam will be held in week 13. This is to assess your actual ability to read and write in Pinyin and listening skills. All reading passages are unseen; however they will use pinyin, grammar, expressions and vocabulary covered in CHN113. No dictionaries are permitted.

Written Assignments

Due: TBA

Weighting: 20%

Totally 4 written assignments including translation and writing throughout the semester. For example, Write a dialogue of no less than 15 turns about ordering food at a restaurant.

Scenario: You and your friends are going to have a dinner at a restaurant. One of your friends is a vegetarian. You need to order some drinks, dishes and a soup.

All assignments with an Arts Faculty coversheet must be submitted at the end of the class on the due date to the lecturer.

Students will only be granted extensions/special consideration with valid reasons (eg., serious and unavoidable disruption from completing any unit requirements in accordance with their ability.) Work that is submitted late will be subjected to an assessment penalty if an extension has not been granted. Even where an extension has been given, a penalty may still be imposed if fairness to other students requires this. The general guideline is that 5% will be deducted for the first day and 2% for each day in subsequent days.
