Unit description

This unit is a study of Roman political and institutional history from the murder of Julius Caesar (44 B.C.) to the First Tetrarchy (A.D. 284-305). We will examine the lives and policies of Roman emperors, as well as the impact of the Roman state on the provinces. The unit will involve study of literary, numismatic, epigraphic, and archaeological evidence.

General Assessment Information

Submission of Written Assignments

The Online Discussion Posts (30%) must be submitted to (1) the Discussion Forum and (2) through TurnItIn. The Coin Assignment (10%), Research Essay (30%), and Final Research

Essay (30%) must be submitted through TurnItIn via the iLearn unit portal.

Length of Written Assignments

The word length for assignments includes quotations, in-text references, and footnotes, but not the bibliography. The length must be within 10% (plus or minus) of the specified word count.

Late Submission Penalty

Unless a Special Consideration request has been submitted and approved, (a) a penalty for lateness will apply – two (2) marks out of 100 will be deducted per day for assignments submitted after the due date – and (b) no assignment will be accepted more than seven (7) days (incl. weekends) after the original submission deadline. No late submissions will be accepted for timed assessments – e.g. quizzes, online tests.

Assessment Tasks

Online Discussion Forum

Due: Friday of tutorial weeks Weighting: 30%

Students are expected to write a 300-word post for the online discussion forum addressing the set tutorial question for the week. The post must include references to the relevant ancient sources and modern scholarship. The post may be a response to a post by another student, but must still show evidence of independent reading and analysis. The discussion post should be uploaded by 11.59pm on the Friday of the 11 tutorial weeks (Weeks 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 13). The discussion post must be uploaded in two locations: (1) on the forum itself, so fellow students can see and respond to each other's posts; (2) on Turnitin, so the post can be marked by the lecturer and checked for originality and academic integrity.

Students will receive a mark out of 10 for each of the 11 weekly forum posts. The lowest mark will be dropped, resulting in an overall mark out of 100 for discussion posts. Students who are

unable to complete their weekly discussion post for health or other reasons must complete a Special Consideration application, otherwise the standard late penalty will apply.

Students will be required to produce an 800-word report on a Roman coin from the Triumviral or Augustan periods, explaining its significance as a source for Roman history. Full details of the assignment will be placed on the iLearn website.

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Research Essay

Due: 07/05/2018 Weighting: 30%

Students will be required to research and write a 2000 word essay on a topic in Roman imperial history. Full details of the assignment will be placed on the iLearn website.

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Final Research Essay

Due: **18/06/2018** Weighting: **30%**

Students will be required to research and write a 2000 word essay on a topic in Roman imperial history dealing with a key theme of the course as a whole. Full details of the assignment will be placed on the iLearn website.
