Unit description

This unit provides a scaffolded curriculum to support experiential learning through a professional work placement. Students will apply the skills and knowledge acquired in a particular discipline to an authentic work setting, and will develop new skills and knowledge which will enable them to participate meaningfully in the workplace. Students will be encouraged to reflect on a learning experience which integrates theory and practice, as well as on their roles and responsibilities as workers and citizens. The unit also introduces them to self-directed lifelong learning. Depending on their discipline and chosen career path students will be able to either apply for a placement available through Macquarie University's pool of experiential activities with partner organisations, or negotiate their own activity with an organisation of their interest. Students will need to complete a minimum of 50 and a maximum of 80 hours of placement. They will also need to attend 5 compulsory on-campus workshops (internal students only). Students interested in this unit must contact the Arts PACE team at least 2 months before the beginning of semester (arts.pace@mq.edu.au).

Learning Contract

Due: Friday 16 March by 6 PM

Weighting: 20%

A learning contract is an agreement between two or more parties of what the student is expected to learn in this unit. The learning contract will include a brief description of the project the student will work on followed by the individual objectives the student has for the unit, how she or he is going to achieve them, how she or he will know these have been achieved, a plan for monitoring progress, and a timeline. The student will prepare the contract based on guidelines that will be

given in class and on iLearn. The contract will need to be signed by the student, host organisation supervisor, and unit convenor.

In three of the online modules (all to be completed online after mid-semester break) you will be required to participate in online discussions and other collaborative activities with members of a group you will be assigned to. You will get a mark out of 10 for your online contribution to each of these modules.

You will be engaging in a series of activities, readings and reflections for each of the modules you complete. You will need to select some of these as you go along as evidence of your progress, of your reflections, and of your learning. You will need to select examples of your work within each module and incorporate it in your e-portfolio, which will be assessed at the end of the semester. Your e-portfolio should also include the poster presented in Workshop 4 and a reflective account of how all the modules connect to each other and to your learning contract. Full guidelines and a rubric will be available on iLearn.

Delivery and Resources

The unit has an academic component (delivered through 5 on campus workshops and 5 online modules) and a practical component which entails students' work for an organisation in the form of an internship. An internship is a structured placement where the student is applying knowledge learned in her or his studies in a professional context. An internship cannot entail a random allocation of tasks but needs to be planned and supervised.

For the academic component students will be required to:

- 1. Submit the required assessment tasks in a timely manner.
- 2. Complete all the required readings for the unit which will be listed on iLearn and made available through e-reserve.
- 3. Contribute to online discussions and activities.
- 4. Deliver a poster presentation to the rest of the classroom.

For the practical component students will be required to:

- 1. Agree on an activity with the host organisation.
- 2. Define a work schedule and commit to it.
- 3. Complete a minimum of 50 placement hours.
