Unit description

This unit comprehensively explores Japanese contemporary culture from socio-cultural, psychological, philosophical and literary perspectives. It will place a particular focus on manga and anime, providing insights into their unique visual and linguistic narratives (such as symbolism, conventions, and the specific features and issues characterising manga/anime creation and circulation) as well as socio-cultural, political and economic influences.

Furthermore, this unit is designed to help students to develop their appreciation of Japanese traditional cultural assets and their continuity with Japanese popular culture. In addition, as a 100 level unit, this unit incorporates basic skills training for research and essay writing. This unit is conducted in English and is open to students of any Faculty interested in Japan.

Unit Participation

Due: **Weekly**

Weighting: **15%**

Internal students are required to actively participate in in-class discussions. External students are required to participate in the external discussions via iLearn whilst studying independently as instructed. Reading Game

Due: **Weekly**

Weighting: **15%**

This task is to enhance your analytical interpretation of the scholarly articles in the JPS124 reading list, in a collaborative way. It requires you to create at least one multiple choice question on one article from the week's reading list and respond to at least five questions provided by other students in the game. This weekly game will be reset at twelve at Saturday night. Further details will be provided in iLearn.

Performing Japan's Pop Culture

Due: **September 29**

Weighting: **30%**

This group presentation involves the creation of a short video capturing your chosen creative example of Japan's Pop Culture (e.g., manga, anime, drama, skit, cosplay, music or drawing) in which you also analytically discuss your creation/performance. Your presentation should be audio recorded. You are also required to complete the self assessment. Further details will be provided in iLearn.

- actively engage with other students and teaching staff and express your ideas and critical opinions both orally and in writing

Essay Presentation

Due: **W13**

Weighting: **5%**

This task requires you to give a 2-3-minute presentation on your essay followed by a Q/A session in group, using only three Powerpoint slides. This is a Pass/Fail task.

Internal students will complete this task in class and External students will make a short video and submitted the external forum. Further details will be provided in iLearn.

Essay

Due: **November 10**

Weighting: **35%**

This task requires you to select:

1. one of the weekly essay questions provided from Week 2 to Week 12 and write a 1500 word essay analytically responding to the essay question based on that week's required reading; OR
2. one or two example(s) of Japanese manga, pop music, anime, films, TV dramas, fashion or games and write a 1500 word essay analytically discussing the relevancy of the work(s) for exploring one (1) of the following issues with identity; otherness; technology; environment; or Japan's war past, for non-Japanese readers/audiences.

The essay should be fully referenced and include appropriate examples and scholarly references, as instructed. Further details will be provided in iLearn.

- develop an insight into the expressive power of Japanese popular culture, and analyse their social, cultural and political significance
- read and interpret academic materials to build understanding of Japanese popular culture related concepts and/or Japanese popular culture productions
- develop and articulate your original views on Japanese popular culture related topics in a clear, analytical and cohesive manner
- search for academic references or other relevant materials
- plan, revise and submit assignments according to schedule and instructions.
