Unit description

This unit aims at cultivating fundamental and practical skills in translation (mainly English to Japanese) and writing in Japanese. It focuses on the application of already acquired knowledge of grammar in practical and authentic writing, and translation tasks. This unit aims to expand students' vocabulary, ability to accurately and appropriately use common phrases, and examines Japanese logic structure, textual coherence and the use of rhetoric. This unit offers skill-based language training. A significant portion of assessment is based on regular practical assignments.

Online Test

In Online Test (90 minutes), you will be required to demonstrate your skills in accurately writing

ideas and translating short passages by using appropriate expressions, grammatical constructions, vocabulary and kanji learned between Week 1 and Week 6. You may refer to seminar slides, dictionaries and machine translations, however, you will not be allowed to seek any other person's help. Please refer to iLearn for details.

Writing Test

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 30%

Writing Test (100 minutes), you will be required to demonstrate your skills in stating their views and opinions by using genre-appropriate expressions, grammatical constructions, vocabulary and kanji, and in translating the similar English texts into Japanese. You will not be allowed to use any resources for this test. Please refer to iLearn for details.
