Unit description

This unit focus on developing skill in the production of short-form fiction, including short story and micro/flash fiction. Students investigate short story structures through close reading of exemplary texts, critical analysis, and writing exercises. A range of narrative techniques key to narrative fiction are explored and applied to students' own work. Students engage in close reading and analysis of published stories. At the outcome of the unit, students will have read and analysed a range of short-form fictions and have written a short story or series of linked micro fictions for their major work.

Our flipped classroom

This unit uses a mode of learning and teaching called the flipped classroom. Students arrive prepared for the seminar, having listened to the pre-recorded lecture and undertaken the readings and other preparation beforehand. All the lectures are accessed through ECHO and you are required to listen to these before the relevant class.

You will read other students' creative writing for workshop before the workshop. Reading and preparing feedback notes is part of your preparation work. Discussions in class extend on these feedback notes. You might (of course) come up with new understandings, responses, ideas during the workshop discussions.

Seminar structure

Weekly seminars Weeks 1-6 will include discussion, worksheets to test your knowledge and skills, and practice tasks to support you to develop your narrative writing skills. Workshop intensive seminars are held from Week 7 through to Week 12.
