Unit description

This unit is offered on a pass/fail basis. This unit enables students to attain well-developed cognitive and practical key legal skills (legal research, reasoning, and writing; applying precedent; statutory interpretation; and legal problem solving) and to acquire an advanced level of foundational legal knowledge (Australian legal institutions; legal theory; comparative legal systems; parliamentary process; role of the judiciary) necessary for further graduate study in law. This unit will challenge students to apply their skills and knowledge to examine a contemporary socio-legal issue through a collaborative group project. Students will also engage in reflective practice.

- 1. All assessment tasks are due by 10:00 am on the dates indicated for each assessment task.
- All assessment tasks are due by the first date as noted. The second 'Hurdle' due date corresponds to the deadline for supplementary work that may need to be completed in order to satisfy the learning outcomes associated with each assessment task.
- All assessment tasks in this unit are 'hurdle requirements' and must be completed at a Satisfactory level (to the standard prescribed for each assessment task) in order to pass this unit.
- 4. In cases where students fail to complete <u>one</u> assessment task at a Satisfactory level (provided that they have made genuine attempts at <u>both</u> initial and supplementary work on that task), the Convenor <u>may</u> provide one further opportunity to reattempt the task or carry out supplementary work in order to achieve the required learning outcome(s). The Convenor will base this decision on a review of the student's work across the unit in consultation with the student's tutor(s) and/or marker(s).
- 5. The Faculty of Arts Late Submission Policy requires that: "Unless a Special Consideration request has been submitted and approved, (a) a penalty for lateness will apply two (2) marks out of 100 will be deducted per day for assignments submitted after the due date and (b) no assignment will be accepted more than seven (7) days (incl. weekends) after the original submission deadline. The timed online quiz in which students demonstrate their understanding of foundational aspects of Australian Law described under the 'Foundations of Law Quiz' assessment task consists of two parts. Part 1 involves a timed multiple choice style quiz that must be completed during the final week of the teaching period. Part 2 involves a verbal quiz conducted remotely (viva voce) that must be completed (at a time of the student's choice from a list of available dates) during the final week of the teaching period or first week of the examination period.

Consists of nine (9) online multiple choice quizzes where students will demonstrate their ability to carry out legal research using online databases, library and internet sources.

 Locate relevant primary and secondary sources through legal research using online databases, library resources and internet sources, and apply research skills to legal analysis.

Core Skills Assessment

Assessment Type ¹: Case study/analysis Indicative Time on Task ²: 25 hours Due: P1:28/9/20 (hurdle 19/10/20); P2:13/11/20 (hurdle 20/11/20) Weighting: 30% This is a hurdle assessment task (see <u>assessment policy</u> for more information on hurdle assessment tasks)

Consists of a short assignment (max 2,500 words, excluding footnotes) submitted online in which students will analyse and interpret primary legal sources (case law and legislation) and relate these to foundational concepts. After successfully completing this formative component, foundational knowledge and application of core skills will also be evaluated through a 15-minute oral assessment (in person or remotely).

On successful completion you will be able to:

- Apply principles of statutory interpretation and the doctrine of precedent to interpret and relate primary legal sources (case law and legislation) for the purpose of deriving legal rules and principles.
- Locate relevant primary and secondary sources through legal research using online databases, library resources and internet sources, and apply research skills to legal analysis.
- Critically analyse contemporary legal problems in their broader social context.
- Identify, describe and relate sources of legal norms and foundational elements of the Australian legal system.

Reflection on Law

Assessment Type 1: Reflective Writing Indicative Time on Task 2: 20 hours Due: **12/10/20 (hurdle 9/11/20)** Weighting: **20%** This is a hurdle assessment task (see <u>assessment policy</u> for more information on hurdle assessment tasks)

Consists of a written reflection (1,500 words) in which students analyse a media article concerning the effectiveness of Australian legal frameworks in addressing a contemporary legal issue.

On successful completion you will be able to:

- Apply principles of statutory interpretation and the doctrine of precedent to interpret and relate primary legal sources (case law and legislation) for the purpose of deriving legal rules and principles.
- Locate relevant primary and secondary sources through legal research using online databases, library resources and internet sources, and apply research skills to legal analysis.
- Critically analyse contemporary legal problems in their broader social context.

Foundations of Law Quiz

Assessment Type 1: Quiz/Test Indicative Time on Task 2: 10 hours Due: 5/11/20 (hurdle 9/11/20) Weighting: 15% This is a hurdle assessment task (see assessment policy for more information on hurdle assessment tasks)

Consists of a timed online quiz in which students demonstrate their understanding of foundational aspects of Australian law, including core concepts in public law.

On successful completion you will be able to:
