Unit description

How to best begin to learn the Polish language via distance education? Students will be introduced to the language through a range of short texts, grammatical explanations, communicative and written practice exercises, including additional information in areas which are known to be especially difficult for native speakers of English. This online unit will equip students with a basic knowledge of Polish vocabulary and grammar, sufficient for developing listening, reading, writing and speaking skills that align with A1 level in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFRL).
