Unit description

One of the most distinctive features of the modern world is its sonic environment. Since the late 19th century we have been able to store and circulate sound on a mass scale, producing a sonic environment that is louder, more saturated and increasingly heterogeneous. We will examine various aspects of sound, including its relationship with politics and technology. We explore what is unique about sonic experience; the history of sound; the production, distribution and consumption of sound; sound and music; sound and image; and sound as embodied experience. We analyse the ways in which sonic experience challenges fundamental assumptions such as the mind/body split and the biological construction of identity. This is relevant to anyone wanting to deepen their understanding of human communication.
