Due: Week 1 Weighting: 15%

This first task is a coprehension exercise based on a short film

On successful completion you will be able to:

- Listening skills: understand enough to be able to meet needs of a concrete type provided speech is clearly and slowly articulated; understand phrases and expressions related to areas of most immediate priority (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment) provided speech is clearly and slowly articulated; identify the main point of TV news items reporting events, accidents etc.
 where the visual supports the commentary; follow changes of topic of factual TV news items, and form an idea of the main content.
- Writing skills: write short, simple formulaic notes relating to matters in areas of immediate need; write a series of simple phrases and sentences linked with simple connectors like "and", "but" and "because"
- Read, listen to, comprehend and discuss a variety of Italian texts.
- Gain an appreciation of the Italian culture through textual (including literature) and aural material introduced in the class resources and discussed online.

- Read, listen to, comprehend and discuss a variety of Italian texts.

Participation

Due: on-going Weighting: 5%

This is based on students participation in the discussion forums, boards etc on iLearn.
