#### Unit description

In this unit students develop their ability to follow complex lines of argument in spoken and written texts in Russian in a range of genres and to identify and extract key information. The unit focuses on practicing skills in expressing and defending sophisticated arguments and opinions and employing strategies to understand and respond to unfamiliar material in preparation for applying language knowledge to social and professional situations. Students will use their judgement in decision-making around communicative tasks (written, oral, spontaneous and prepared) in meaningful everyday contexts.

### Written test

#### Final test

Assessment Type 1: Quiz/Test Indicative Time on Task 2: 2 hours

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 45%

The purpose of the test is to check students' knowledge of all aspects of grammar and vocabulary that they learned throughout the semester. This test will be conducted online.

On successful completion you will be able to:

- Develop comprehensive intermediate level skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking in the Russian language.
- Identify, evaluate and deploy a broad range of grammatical structures of Russian at intermediate level.
- Demonstrate a refined awareness of language and language use, in both Russian and in English.

#### Oral test

Assessment Type 1: Presentation Indicative Time on Task 2: 2 hours

Due: Week 12 Weighting: 30%

For the oral test, students have to prepare a three-minute talk on a topic of their choice. Students will be assessed on their presentation, as well as their ability to answer follow-up questions. This will be a part of regular seminar time. Online students will do this task via Zoom.
