Assessment Type 1: Presentation Indicative Time on Task 2: 2 hours Due: **Week 12** Weighting: **20%**

For the oral test, students have to prepare a three-minute talk on a topic of their choice. Students will be assessed on their presentation, as well as their ability to answer follow-up questions. This will be a part of regular seminar time. Online students will do this task via Zoom.
