Unit description

Advance your intermediate level Polish language skills by reading about Poland. This online unit explores the intersection between language and culture by examining a range of texts and practical activities in the context of travelling around Poland and through Polish history. Activities include reading passages and associated vocabulary practice, detailed treatment of the parts of speech, the syntax of the simple Polish sentence, conversation practice, composition writing and translation. This unit aims to develop students' language skills to B1+ level in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFRL).

General Assessment Information

Electronic submission

Use of plagiarism detection software

Late Assessment Penalty

Unless a Special Consideration request has been submitted and approved, (a) a penalty for lateness will apply – two (2) marks out of 100 will be deducted per day for assignments submitted after the due date – and (b) no assignment will be accepted more than seven (7) days (incl. weekends) after the original submission deadline. No late submissions will be accepted for timed assessments – e.g. quizzes, online tests.
