- Demonstrate a refined awareness of language and language use, in both Italian and in English.

Online Quizzes

Assessment Type ¹: Quiz/Test

Indicative Time on Task ²: 15 hours

Due: **Week 3, 6 & 10**

Weighting: **20%**

Online assessment covering individual book chapters and revision work.

language.

Oral Video Presentation

Assessment Type ¹: Media presentation

Indicative Time on Task ²: 9 hours

Due: **Week 13**

Weighting: **10%**

Students are required to prepare and perform a role play in Italian and record it on a video file. Students will complete this task online via synchronous and/or asynchronous activities. See iLearn for more information.

Listening Comprehension

Assessment Type ¹: Quiz/Test

Indicative Time on Task ²: 2 hours

Due: **Week 13**

Weighting: **10%**

Students will listen to an audio recording and then answer a series of comprehension questions. External students will complete online.

On successful completion you will be able to:

- Develop intermediate level skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking in the Italian language.
- Apply relevant language conventions to create meaningful intercultural encounters.

- Identify, evaluate and deploy the grammatical structures of Italian at intermediate level.

Final Online Test

Assessment Type ¹: Quiz/Test

Indicative Time on Task ²: 2 hours

Due: **Week 13**

Weighting: **30%**

Final test covering all material studied in second semester. Student will complete their final test online.
