Unit description

This unit provides French conversation classes for leisure or business travellers. Students will learn practical spoken French that can be applied to real-life situations in international French speaking environments. Lessons cover everyday conversational experiences, teaching all kinds of travellers how to take and access public transport in Paris and metropolitan France, how to order and buy food in restaurants and supermarkets, how to book and arrange for suitable accommodation and how to organise activities and excursions on their travels. The unit is suitable for beginners in spoken French, no prior knowledge of French is required.
