Delivery and Resources

The unit is organised into **6 parts**. Parts 1-2 are offered remotely in December 2020. Six seminars, covering Parts 3-6, will be held between 5 to 14 January 2020. It is necessary to attend <u>all</u> seminars.

All seminars will be conducted **face-to-face and also available online**. Zoom meeting links are on iLearn. Each seminar is 2 hours.

A series of 6 **recorded audio Mini-lectures** (around 30 minutes each) is available via **Echo**. You are required to listen to **Mini-lectures 1 and 2**, and do the associated reading, in December 2020. You are required to listen to **Mini-lecture 3**, and do the associated reading, <u>before</u> the first seminar on 4 January 2021. The rest of the schedule, covering Parts 4-6, will be explained by the convenor.

Assessments are to be submitted via Turnitin.

Late submissions
