Written Assignment

Assessment Type 1: Problem set Indicative Time on Task 2: 4 hours

Due: Week 4, Week 7 and Week 10

Weighting: 45%

This assessment will be delivered in three separate assignments each worth 15 marks. Students will need to answer a set of questions based on the lecture content covered in class and/or online.

- Apply relevant language conventions to create meaningful intercultural encounters.

Online Quiz

Assessment Type 1: Quiz/Test Indicative Time on Task 2: 3 hours Due: Week 6, Week 8 and Week 12

Weighting: 30%

This assessment task will be delivered in three separate online quizzes each worth 10 marks. Quizzes consist of both closed (e.g. multiple-choice, matching) and open type questions (e.g. filling the gaps, short answer) and are based on the unit content covered in class and/or online.

On successful completion you will be able to:

- Identify, evaluate and deploy the grammatical structures of Croatian at elementary level.
- Apply relevant language conventions to create meaningful intercultural encounters.
- Demonstrate an awareness of some language and language use in both Croatian and English.

Oral Presentation

Assessment Type 1: Quiz/Test Indicative Time on Task 2: 1 hours

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 25%

Oral Presentation is to be delivered in the end of the term. It can be done in person (on-campus) or online. Students are required to prepare a 2-3-minute speech on a familiar topic in advance and present it to the examiner. In the second part of the presentation, students will need to answer several simple questions asked by the examiner.

- understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type,
- introduce themselves and others and ask and answer questions about personal details such as where you live, people you know and things you have
- interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly and clearly and is prepared to help.
