Unit description

This is an advanced legal research unit for Bachelor of Laws students intending to graduate with Honours. In this unit, students work under the close supervision of the academic convenor of the unit and their research supervisor to develop a thesis that addresses a contemporary legal problem. Building on the methodology, plan and literature review developed in Legal Research Project A, students will complete an advanced independent legal research project in the form of a 15,000 word thesis. This unit requires advanced independent legal research skills, the ability to engage in self directed research under supervision, and superior legal writing ability. The unit is particularly suited to Law students considering higher degree research.

General Assessment Information

Late assessment submission policy

Extended Honours Thesis

Assessment Type 1: Thesis

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 70%

Students will prepare a written thesis of no more than 15,000 words. This thesis will build on the preparation undertaken in Laws5920
