Written Assignments

This task assesses the writing skills of the students, and includes short essay writing and passages for translation.

Oral

Assessment Type ¹: Simulation/role play

Indicative Time on Task ²: 10 hours

Due: **Week 10 Tuesday 09/05/23 and Thursday 11/05/23 during class**

Weighting: **20%**

This task assesses students' oral language proficiency. It may take the form of a role play or individual interview.

- Develop advanced level skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking in the Chinese

language.

- Identify, evaluate and deploy the grammatical structures of Chinese at advanced level.
- Apply relevant language conventions to create meaningful intercultural encounters.
- Demonstrate a sophisticated awareness of language and language use, in both Chinese and in English.

Test

Assessment Type ¹: Quiz/Test

Indicative Time on Task ²: 20 hours

Due: **Week 13 Thursday 01/06/23 (11:00-13:00)**

Weighting: **40%**

Testing assesses mastery of the content learned in the semester.

- Identify, evaluate and deploy the grammatical structures of Chinese at advanced level.
- Demonstrate a sophisticated awareness of language and language use, in both Chinese and in English.
