Unit description

This unit introduces students to Japanese literary works and is designed to enhance their understanding of Japanese literature in linguistic, socio-cultural and historical contexts. The unit will cover the ancient to the current period through diverse texts such as poetry and all forms of narratives including i-novels, fantasies and thrillers. It will also examine rich intertextuality found in Japanese literature, as exemplified in manga/anime works inspired by the Japanese classical masterpiece, *The Tale of Genji*.

General Assessment Information

Late Submissions, Extensions and Supplementary Tests

Late Assessment Penalty

Retelling narratives

Assessment Type 1: Media presentation Indicative Time on Task 2: 30 hours

Due: 11:55pm Friday 15 September

Weighting: 30%

This task is for you to produce your own creative work inspired by one classical Japanese literary work (e.g., poetry, folktale and the Tale of Genji), and make a video presentation to demonstrate your creative work, then discuss it analytically. You are also required to complete the self-assessment.
