Unit description

During the second half of the semester, in collaboration with our industry partners, students will engage in a significant project that reflects the real-world challenges and practices of the finance industry.

Group (or individual) Presentation

Assessment Type: presentation

Indicative Time on Task: 20 hours

Due: Week 6 (project 1) and 12 (project 2)

Weighting: 30%

The students will present their projects to the class, including a critical analysis of the process, strategies used, results achieved, and their reflections. The presentation should showcase the individual or group's problem-solving skills, teamwork, and ability to communicate complex financial concepts and strategies effectively.

Late Assessment Submission Penalty (written assessments)

Final Report

This report should display the students' understanding of the relevant financial concepts, critical evaluation of their application, and reflection on the learnings from the project.
