Unit description

This unit provides an overview of creative practices in the media industries, with an emphasis on media production. It examines elements of creative expression and communications through case studies, and explores varied approaches, creative strategies, and skills for digital and online media production. Students in this unit will produce short from media content involving text, digital video, image, and sound.

General Assessment Information
