Unit Schedule

A hurdle requirement is a Macquarie University endorsed activity for which a minimum level of performance or participation is a condition of passing the unit in which it occurs.

For the Master of Disability Studies, hurdles are applied for each of the specialisations. It is mandatory for students to demonstrate that hurdles have been met prior to enrolling in their professional experience unit, SPED8910.

For the 'Education: Deaf/Hard of Hearing' specialisation: SPED8906 Auslan Competency - a hurdle unit that requires students (who have commenced their studies from 2025) to demonstrate competency in Auslan (Australian Sign Language) levels 1 and 2 and successful passing of an Auslan Basic assessment. Students must complete this unit prior to enrolment in their professional experience unit, SPED8910. Students that commenced the Master of Disability Studies prior to 2025 should contact the Graduate Studies Coordinator for hurdle advice and information.

Auslan Basic Assessment will be held on **20-21 May 2025**. This will be facilitated by a Deaf Connect examiner online via Zoom. Students need to register for the Auslan Basic Assessment via the NextSense website. Once completed, the Auslan Basic Assessment outcome document must be uploaded to the SPED8906 iLearn site by the end of week 13. Please note a registration fee applies for the assessment.
