Unit description

This unit introduces students of history and archaeology to the study of ancient and medieval Latin. No previous language study or knowledge of Latin is expected. It provides a systematic introduction to the grammar (especially morphology and basic syntax) and vocabulary. The unit also aims to help students develop the skills necessary for reading original Latin texts and encourages development of highly transferable knowledge and skills in the spoken and written expression of English and engages with Machine-Learning tools including generative AI.

General Assessment Information
