Unit description

This unit will provide you with the foundations for understanding the field of public health and build your knowledge and skills towards becoming a public health practitioner. It introduces you to the core functions of public health with attention to the role that different health fields and disciplines play in contributing to health protection and promotion in diverse communities and populations. You will gain an understanding of different public health models, approaches and perspectives, and learn to apply these to analysing contemporary public health issues. This foundational unit will equip you with practical skills essential in moving forward your studies and future public health practice.
