Unit description

This unit introduces you to the linguistics of signed languages, with particular reference to Auslan as it relates to interpreting. The unit includes language structure (phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and discourse) based on the Auslan corpus, starting with the semiotic elements available to all languages. The use of space, depicting signs and constructed action are a major applied focus at the on-campus sessions. You will apply your linguistic knowledge to the computerised annotation and analysis of an Auslan text.
