Unit description

This unit is the second in a sequence of two which focuses on learning how to teach the Arts in a secondary school context. Emphasis is placed on acquiring the skills and knowledge for planning engaging learning sequences. Students will work with syllabus documents for Stage 6 to interpret learning outcomes, develop programs, implement assessment strategies, use ICT effectively and create resources. The aim is for students to develop a range of research-informed approaches to teaching, reflect on their teaching practices and demonstrate awareness of the diverse needs of the students in their classes.

Special Consideration / Late Penalties

Applications for extensions must be made via Service Connect. After the 7th day, a mark of 0 (zero) will be awarded even if the assessment is submitted. Submission time for all written assessments is set at 11:55pm. A 1-hour grace period is provided to students who experience a technical issue. This late penalty will apply to non-timed sensitive assessments (incl. essays, reports, posters, portfolios, journals, recordings etc).

Late submission of time sensitive tasks (such as tests/exams, performance assessments/ presentations, scheduled practical assessments/labs etc) will only be addressed by the unit convenor in a Special Consideration application. A Special Consideration outcome may result in a new question or topic.

Marking

All assessments are marked using a rubric.

Marking of all assessments is moderated by the Unit Convenor.

Assignments will be awarded grades ranging from HD to F according to guidelines set out in the University's Grading System and University Assessment Policy.

To attain a pass or higher grade in Professional Experience a student must obtain a satisfactory in both the Professional Experience component **and** a pass or higher grade in the academic component. The Macquarie Teaching Performance Assessment (MQTPA - in final WIL/PEx units) is marked as Not met, Met or Exceeds.

Viva Voce

Viva Voce – students will deliver a 10-minute viva voce during the examination period. The viva voce will focus on professional knowledge and classroom practice.

Delivery and Resources

Learning and teaching activities in this unit include a weeky 1 hr lecture and a 2 hr tutorial as well as required readings, forums posts and independent learning. Weekly lecture and tutorial content is outlined in the iLearn site. Weekly readings can be found in Leganto (see iLearn).

The second in a sequence of two units focused on learning how to teach the Arts in a secondary school context, the unit will provide opportunities to acquire the skills and knowledge needed for planning engaging learning sequences in English or Languages.

Students will work with Stage 6 syllabus documents to interpret learning outcomes, develop programs, implement assessment strategies, use ICT effectively and create engaging resources suitable for the range of students in their future classrooms.

Extensive use will be made of case studies, resources and work samples sourced from a range of schools, classroom practices will be modelled, and there will be opportunities for professional connections to be shaped. The aim is for students to learn how to translate theory to practice in order to develop a range of research-informed approaches to teaching, to reflect on their teaching practices, and demonstrate awareness of the diverse needs of the students in their classes.
