Unit description

This unit is focused on simultaneous interpreting (SI) practice from English into Language Other Than English (LOTE) for first semester Master of Conference Interpreting students. You will learn how to use acquired skills to apply various strategies in dealing with different constraints in the on-line information process. Students are required to simultaneously interpret both improvised and well-prepared speeches on wide-ranging topics into LOTE, which are selected from various sources according to difficulty levels.
