Unit description

Approaching the study of music through the broad topics of traditions, instruments, industries and technologies, this unit situates and explores music in a global context. Students investigate how musicians create, adapt and perform music in various cultural, historical and global contexts, including in Western classical and diverse modern traditions and forms. The unit will also have an emphasis on the diversity of such musical practices and traditions in various contexts. A range of themes will be covered, including ideas of improvisation/ composition, instrument structure/symbolism, the popularization of traditional practices, classical/folk/popular traditions, and the music of First Nations peoples.

General Assessment Information

Late Submission of Assessments
