Unit description

Human evolution has produced a species so numerous and technologically sophisticated that our activities influence the very future of Earth, including our own species' survival or destruction. How has human evolution generated such a potential fate? This unit examines how developments like agriculture, urbanisation, and advanced technology affect us today and into the future. Students will learn about the evolutionary origin of human distinctiveness, including traits crucial in differentiating our ancestors' ways of life from other apes, such as bipedalism, tool use, cooperative social life, and comprehension of our own mortality. Drawing from a range of disciplines, the unit highlights key debates, breakthrough discoveries, and an up-to-date account of how our species evolved. The unit does not require a background in the biological or evolutionary sciences; it specifically addresses questions about the significance of our origins and evolutionary processes on contemporary topics, including health, diversity, environmentalism, and the ethical development of technology.

General Assessment Information
