Unit description

This unit develops students' capabilities for professional practice so that they are better prepared for their transition to their chosen career. The unit frames professional learning within the broader context of learning and professional practices and considers various aspects of becoming a professional. Students work in teams throughout the semester, developing and critically reflecting on their employability, while building language and communication skills for learning and professional practice. Individual and team assessment tasks address a number of Macquarie University's graduate capabilities, including effective communication; social responsibility; and professional and personal judgement and initiative.

Personal Presentation and Plan

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Students will be required to submit a video recording of themselves that could be utilised on professional (LinkedIn) and/or job application websites. The video includes a self-introduction as a potential job candidate, stating relevant qualifications and skills for the role.

Part B: Written Plan

Weighting: 30%

A career plan will provide you with the opportunity to synthesize and document relevant information and insights regarding your future career goals. Students will be required to submit a written career plan of 500 words (+/- 10%, excluding reference list and appendices). Ensure that the document is complete before submission via iLearn.

Marking will be based on rubrics available on iLearn. Further detailed instructions will be provided on iLearn and discussed in class.

Students will be given a choice of current professional workplace topics and can choose to develop a management solution to the contemporary challenges posed. The presentation should be based on sound academic research into current trends in corporate thinking and will require a

15-minute group presentation of the issue and then provide recommendations for action.

Assessment of individual performance in group work will be based on the presentation and peer evaluation ratings (statement of individual contribution) subject to the final decision of the Lecturer. Further details of the assignment, peer evaluation, and the marking rubric will be discussed in class and are available on iLearn.

Submission of assignments

Each group will deliver an oral presentation and submit a peer evaluation form (statement of individual contribution) in class.

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Delivery and Resources

Unit Structure

The unit focuses on professional skills development and will be conducted in a twice weekly two-hour workshop, combined with a weekly one-hour online tutorial via iLearn, over 5 weeks. The sessions for each week are at 10:00 AM and 1:00 PM on either a Monday or a Wednesday depending on which stream you are enrolled into.

Important Note: Please be aware that while there is no mark allocated for attendance, active participation is expected across a range of individual and group exercises in class and as such we expect and will take attendance in each session.

Students will be assigned into teams during the first workshop (Week 1). Those enrolling later will be added to a new team or to existing ones. In order to satisfactorily pass this unit, you must achieve an overall minimum mark of 50%. For a student to be successful in this unit and to gain the most out of the Unit, regular participation and

work on the assessment tasks are essential. Come prepared to the workshops and set a schedule for yourself early on in the semester to successfully manage your time on the assignment tasks.

Class sizes are limited and attendance will be taken in class each session. Once you are included in a class, you MUST remain in that class and attend that each week. Changes will not be permitted.
