Unit description

This unit develops students' capabilities for professional practice so that they are better prepared for their transition to their chosen career. The unit frames professional learning within the broader context of learning and professional practices and considers various aspects of becoming a professional. Students work in teams throughout the semester, developing and critically reflecting on their employability, while building language and communication skills for learning and professional practice. Individual and team assessment tasks address a number of Macquarie University's graduate capabilities, including effective communication; social responsibility; and professional and personal judgement and initiative.

Class Presentation

Due: Weeks 3-9

Weighting: 15%

Students will be required to give an individual presentation of 3 minutes in class on a topic of their choosing. Audio visual aids such as PowerPoint and Prezi may be used but no notes or palm cards are permitted.

Value: 15%

These talks will be conducted in class over weeks 3-9 as class numbers dictate.

Personal Video Presentation

Due: Week 5

Weighting: 20%

Students will be required to submit a video recording of themselves that could be utilised on LinkedIn assuming them as a potential job candidate, stating their skills and qualifications for the role. 20% - due end of Week 5.

Marking will be based on structure, delivery and content of the presentation.

Management Assignment

Due: Week 9

Weighting: 40%

Students will be given a choice of current management topics and can choose to develop a management solution to the challenges posed. The responses should be based on sound academic research into current trends in corporate thinking and will require a 3,000 word review of the situation and then provide recommendations for action.

Further details of the assignment and the Marking Rubric will be released on iLearn. Marking will be based on the level of insight, professionalism and academic research clearly demonstrated in the submission.

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Reflective Journal

Due: Week 12 Weighting: 25%

The Reflective Journal requires you to gain insight into your own personal skill set against Graduate Capabilities and reflect on the impact that your current abilities will have on future career expectations. There is a short pre-work exercise completed in class in Week 3 of our sessions. You will be required to submit your work on iLearn and in hard copy in class. This submission is not graded.

The final report is due in Week 12.

Unit Structure

The unit focuses on personal skills development and will be conducted in a weekly two-hour workshop combined with a weekly one-hour online tutorial over 13 weeks.
