Unit description

This unit focuses on developing students' advanced translation and writing skills. The unit gives students opportunities to compose and translate a wide range of texts in and into Japanese, covering different forms, genres and situations. This unit helps students to refine their usage of grammar, vocabulary and idiomatic expressions to suit particular text types and audiences. Both translation and creative writing tasks comprise a significant portion of assessment.

Attendance/participation

Due: Weekly Weighting: 10%

Weekly Assignment

Due: Weekly Weighting: 30%

Students are required to complete a weekly review task in the proceeding week, hand-written on Japanese manuscript paper or online.

Test 1

Due: Week 7 Weighting: 25% Test 1 (70 minutes), students will demonstrate their skills in expressing ideas and translating short passages. It is a hand-written test and conducted in class for internal students and online for external students. Please refer to iLearn for details.

Test 2

Due: Week 13 Weighting: 35%

Test 2 (100 minutes), students will demonstrate their skills in stating their views and opinions by using genre appropriate expression, grammatical constructions, vocabulary and kanji, and in translating the similar English texts into Japanese. It is a hand-written test and conducted in class for internal students and online for external students.Please refer to iLearn for details.
