Unit description

This unit is offered specifically for Japanese language learners with a high level of Japanese language proficiency, students with Japanese language background and Japanese native speakers. It examines the complexity and sensitivity of the cross-cultural and linguistic issues of bilingualism, through detailed comparisons of Japanese and English materials in diverse genres. It aims at further developing students' intercultural competence that would assist them in their future career as well as Japanese/English bilingual capacity, consolidating the foundations for professional translation and interpreting.

General Assessment Information Attendance

Participation

Due: weekly Weighting: 15%

For satisfactory completion of this task, students are required to actively participate in all activities (both online and in-class, where applicable) and complete weekly assessment tasks by the due dates. Internal students are required to attend the class in time, and contribute to inclass discussion/activities. External students are required to listen to the weekly seminar recordings, actively participate in online activities, and study independently as instructed. 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Weekly Quizzes

Due: **Weekly** Weighting: **35%**

The quizzes are conducted for the students to review the key concepts of weekly lecture. The main focus will be on theoretical models of intercultural communication. The instruction will be available in class and/or iLearn.

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Presentation

Due: Week 9
Weighting: 20%

The students are required to give a presentation about their findings of linguistic/ contextual differences between Japanese and English, using the theoretical framework that has been introduced from week 1 till week 7. External students are required to give a presentation via Voice Thread, as instructed. The instruction and marking criteria will be provided in class and/or iLearn.

Research Paper

Due: 9 Nov 2018 (Week 13)

Weighting: 30%
